

Dear Friends,

This past year has been one of building partnerships, achieving key outcomes, and executing many firsts in the life of Chicagoland Habitat for Humanity (CHFH). The generous support and leadership of our friends helped us reach numerous milestones. **Thank you**.

One of the most significant highlights of the past year was the four day blitz build on Chicago's Magnificent Mile titled **Raise Your Hand Chicagoland** (RYHC). After an 18-month planning phase – led by Co-Chairs John Edwardson, Steve Crown, and Steering Committee Chair Ted Dosch – CHFH and area affiliates built wall frames for 13 homes on Pioneer Court at the Jean Baptiste Point Du Sable homesite (considered to be the first permanent residence in Chicago). The effort raised over \$1.2 million for Habitat's work in the region, along with raising eyebrows and awareness with a fully built exterior of one Habitat home for public tours. In addition, 505 volunteers contributed to the Habitat build, and 50 donors led by BMO Harris Bank and Lowe's at the Community Builder sponsor level supported the effort.

Another key highlight of the past year was the partnerships built with the eight **local Habitat affiliates** to support their work. Their relationship and expertise was critical to the success of RYHC. On the ground, at the local level, the Habitat affiliates served 172 families last year and thousands of families over the past 30 years. The eight affiliates and CHFH together shared a combined budget of nearly \$14 million. As a key goal of Chicagoland HFH, we provided over \$600,000 in direct funding and in-kind support to the local affiliates in the region. That's 13 times more than was provided the previous year.

Finally, we'd like to highlight the current and past leadership of the **CHFH board**, as key partners who have guided CHFH to this point in its history. Their dedication, expertise, and support have brought us so far. Special thanks to former board member Joe Mulvey – who helped lead CHFH efforts for so long with passion and commitment.

Within our first ever annual report are four stories – examples of the many stories that are so critical to the impact we have: partner families, volunteers, donors, and local Habitat affiliates. These are just a few of the **partnerships built** that elevate all of Habitat for Humanity in Chicagoland to succeed in its mission.

Thank you again for the impact you had this past year. We look forward to strengthening our partnership as we grow.

About Chicagoland Habitat for Humanity

The need for affordable housing in the Chicago area is great – too great for any one organization to tackle alone. Close to 400,000 individuals are severely burdened by housing costs, live in inadequate housing, or experience both of these challenges.

Chicagoland Habitat for Humanity (CHFH) is an innovative approach to help leverage the Habitat model and brand, the local affiliate leadership, and our scale across the area to maximize Habitat's impact in addressing the vast regional need for affordable housing. Together with CHFH, the eight affiliates shared a collective budget of nearly \$14 million and served 172 families throughout the region last year.

Working collectively within this regional Habitat structure helps create greater impact. This collaboration also allows Habitat to partner with donors, volunteers, and other affordable housing providers in a unified way so we can tackle the regional housing challenge as one Habitat. CHFH has an ambitious goal to help raise the needed funds and awareness to serve 500 families annually and continue towards 1,000 each year – which would be six times the number of families served in 2014.

Last year, CHFH aggressively began its efforts to strengthen not only the organization's infrastructure but also provide support to the eight local affiliates to build capacity and serve more families. In 2014 alone, over \$600,000 of funding and in-kind donations went directly to local area affiliates. These funds go to support operations and capacity building efforts that will help us reach our goals.

As Chicagoland Habitat for Humanity grows, our vision is to provide increasingly more direct funding, awareness, and support services to our affiliate partners to maximize our collective impact.

We have an ambitious goal to help raise the needed funds and awareness to serve 500 families annually and continue towards 1,000 each year.



FAMILY PARTNERS

THE JOHNSON FAMILY

Habitat for Humanity doesn't give away homes. Partner families are selected based on housing need, income, and willingness to partner, then work hard to purchase a home at an affordable rate with no profit added to the price. Sarah Johnson – just one of the partner families served by the eight Chicago area affiliates – is on that path to homeownership with her family.

"As a single parent raising 3 children on my own," explained Sarah, "it's been extremely hard to care for them financially. At one point I picked up a second job, but couldn't find a reliable babysitter so I let the job go. I struggled to find a home for my family that was adequate and affordable. The home we're currently in is out of my financial range and has issues with the plumbing and insulation. Because of my landlord's procrastinations, I paid for several home repairs to get the job done. I manage to keep my household together with a little prayer."

172 partner families were served by eight affiliates last year.

Partner families contribute between 400-500 sweat equity hours building their homes and the homes of their neighbors, save for a down payment, and attend homebuyer education classes prior to closing on their homes. Partner family mortgage payments then go back to the affiliate, allowing them to build more homes with local, hard-working families and the community.

"Nothing about this program has been easy," Sarah said. "You have to take classes and there's a lot of paperwork because they have to see you're serious about wanting to be a homeowner, but it's all worth it. This home symbolizes a new beginning for me and my family."

At every step in the process, including after a home is purchased, Habitat is there to support families. "My relationship with Habitat will allow me to provide a decent and affordable home for my family. I may have repairs, but I will be in control of them. I am looking forward to working at the sites where I can gain home maintenance skills. To become a homeowner is my dream and I will continue to work hard at making my dream come true. I am looking forward to a more secure future for my family and me."



VOLUNTEER PARTNERS

ANIXTER INTERNATIONAL INC. AND BMO HARRIS BANK

Volunteers are the heart of Habitat for Humanity. Each year, thousands of volunteers partner to lend a hand to build and rehabilitate homes with affiliates in Chicagoland. Habitat relies on individual and group volunteers to ensure that everyone can live in safe, decent, and affordable housing.

Anixter International Inc. partnered with Chicagoland Habitat for Humanity on Raise Your Hand Chicagoland – with Anixter providing financial sponsorship at the Home Builder level and volunteer support to the event.

Thirty-four Anixter employees were onsite and many participated in the house build. Others volunteered at an Anixter booth encouraging passersby to "like" the company and "post a selfie" on the company's Facebook page; in turn, Anixter donated a dollar for every new posting. Anixter employees around the world were also encouraged to participate in the fundraising with matching dollars provided by the Anixter Cares program.

"At Anixter, we were excited to be part of this experience – not only as a corporate sponsor but also as individual volunteers – wanting to make a difference in people's lives," said Ted Dosch, Anixter Executive Vice President, Finance and Chief Financial Officer. Dosch is a long-time Habitat supporter and board member of CHFH as well as Chair of the RYHC Steering Committee. BMO Harris Bank was a lead sponsor and key partner of RYHC – with BMO Harris employees volunteering at the event on multiple days. On June 4, the annual BMO Volunteer Day, another 150 employees worked at two Habitat locations in Chicagoland. Each year, BMO Harris Bank employees give back to several nonprofit organizations to support the communities they serve. In 2014, nearly 800 employees from Chicago contributed thousands of hours to three organizations, including Habitat for Humanity. Across Canada and the U.S., over 6,000 employees gave back to over 400 projects on BMO Volunteer Day.

Mark Furlong, Chief Executive Officer of BMO Harris Bank N.A., not only helped lead the corporate sponsorship team for RYHC, he pounded nails alongside his team. "It's a natural for us to help build homes," he said. "We are proud to help Habitat make homeownership a reality for families throughout Chicagoland."

Habitat homes are built almost entirely by volunteers, both skilled and unskilled. Habitat affiliates, ReStores, and support organizations – in partnership with staff – are led by volunteer board members, committee members, groups of young professionals and other volunteers. The planning team for RYHC consisted mostly of volunteers and – at the event – 505 volunteers built 13 homes in four days. In addition, hundreds of interested spectators signed up to volunteer onsite and online.

Last year, close to 45,000 volunteers provided approximately 200,000 volunteer hours to support Habitat's work throughout the region. Our hope and goal is to increase the number of volunteers engaged with Habitat – on build sites, in leadership positions, in the office, at affiliate ReStores, and at events. To reach our goal of 500-1,000 families served each year, Habitat will need hundreds of thousands more volunteers just like the teams from Anixter and BMO Harris Bank.





DONOR PARTNERS

JOHN EDWARDSON AND A. STEVEN CROWN

No strangers to the corporate or philanthropic landscape of Chicagoland, John Edwardson and Steve Crown served as Co-Chairs of Raise Your Hand Chicagoland. As ambassadors of Habitat of Humanity, they rallied support for the first-of-its-kind undertaking and helped the event reach its fundraising goal.

John is the retired Chair and Chief Executive Officer of CDW Corporation, a provider of technology products and services. Steve is a general partner at Henry Crown & Co., a private investment company in Chicago.

"You can give a man a fish and feed him for one day," said John, "or you can teach him how to fish and feed him for a lifetime. Habitat feeds people for a lifetime and changes their lives. It gives them pride. They learn how to be a homeowner, how to maintain a home, how to pay for a home. And what it does for parents and children is unbelievably positive."

Steve became involved with Habitat after Hurricane Katrina. "Because of that event," said Steve, "I became more aware of the importance of affordable housing – not only for those who had been devastated by a disaster but for the many people who either pay too much or are forced to live in substandard housing every day – even in our own backyard. Chicago has a long and proud history. We're here – with our hands, our hammers and our hearts – so that more people can achieve the dream of homeownership."

John and Steve gave their time, their talents, and their resources to Habitat for Humanity. Their generous leadership gifts were part of the over \$1.2 million raised from 50 corporate sponsors, organizations, and individuals to support the work of Habitat for Humanity in Chicagoland.


