

Robin shared that her terminallyill husband is in hospice at home, and since returning to North Dakota, Buddy is providing lots of stress relief – and kisses – to Robin and her husband. "I'm so glad to have my baby back," she shared. We are so glad, too!

The five babies were nestled in a box with food, fresh water, and bedding. 



Partnership with COA Brings Food to Pets in Need





Our Pets for Life team has had to get creative in how they serve families and animals through the COVID-19 crisis. We usually connect with community members through daily door-to-door outreach, but that wasn't possible this summer as we worked to keep our community and staff safe. The team found ways to support the nearly 8,000 families and 15,000 pets we serve, including texts and phone calls, supply drop-offs, and telemedicine appointments. But we missed seeing the families we serve, and we were so excited in June to add a partnership with COA Youth and Family Services' Goldin Center, in the heart of our focus community.

Through the partnership, our team was able to provide pet food alongside COA's weekly food pantry items, which provided the perfect chance for our Pets for Life team to catch up with current clients, meet new families, and hear from the community – all from a safe distance. Each Saturday we were there, we distributed roughly 150 bags of pet food and litter. Thanks so much to COA for hosting us and for getting resources out to the community!

We continue to offer free spay/neuter and other services to families with pets in our service area, which has little access to pet care information or services.

Virtual Programs Reach New Young People

This summer was an amazing one for animal-loving kids in the communities we serve and beyond! In addition to weekly virtual story times with animal guests, we continued to host virtual birthday parties we launched this spring. These programs helped us to reach a wider audience; one of the birthday kids we hosted was in Boston, and they had a guest celebrating with them from South Africa!

We also offered virtual camps in June that brought fun, engaging activities to young people's homes. Every camper's favorite part of the day is getting to meet an animal, even when those visits were via webcam! One of our camper's parents E-mailed: "I'm blown away by the level of enthusiasm the instructors are bringing, the engagement of the campers, and how much planning went into a successful virtual format. A lot of organizations have been attempting a virtual camp; and this is by far one of the best I've seen. Thank you for this wonderful offering." We were thrilled to get such a positive response!



Although campers loved our virtual camps, we also knew that families were looking for safe ways to provide more social outlets for their children. In July, we launched in-person camps with enhanced safety precautions. Campers participated in physically distanced games, crafts, and interactions with animals including dogs, cats, rabbits, ferrets, and bearded dragons. We even had a visit from the Milwaukee Brewers Racing Sausages at our Milwaukee Campus! Camps also included some amazing virtual visits from animal experts across the country, including guests from a farm sanctuary, a local wildlife photographer, and a beekeeper.

As we prepare for fall, we look forward to offering small, in-person programs as safety allows, and we will also provide fun and engaging virtual programs for schools, Scouts, and young people in our communities.

I have gained useful skills, met great people, and because of my great experiences, I am working toward becoming a wildlife rehabber. I really value what I have learned while at the Humane Society and I plan to stay involved."
