Last year between June 26 – July 25, there were 81 adoptions completed by SHHS. This year in the same timespan, the incredible WHS Kenosha Campus team performed an impressive 133 adoptions! So many animals found loving homes, and we look forward to making even more matches in the months to come.

We're also thrilled to share that we are welcoming Dr. Noelle Schariest as our full-time vet for the Kenosha Campus! Vegas now has several human siblings who adore him and constantly keep him busy, and his behavior has truly transformed. We're so grateful to the Clarks for taking a chance on this amazing boy, to his foster parent Julianna for opening her home and heart when he needed it most, and to everyone who helped spread the word about Vegas to find such an excellent match!



FUN AT SUMMER CAMP



Summer camp was a blast at our Milwaukee, Ozaukee, and Racine Campuses. We engaged more than 350 young people, including 60 scholarship recipients and 25 youth leaders in our summer camp experience. Campers visited with domestic animals, gained insight on how to safely interact with pets, and learned more about careers at WHS. Our Junior Veterinary Camp attendees performed mock surgeries and watched our veterinarians perform real procedures.

BABY AMERICAN KESTREL REUNITED WITH FAMILY

Tremendous thank you to our community partner, Skedaddle Humane Wildlife Control, for re-nesting this American Kestrel patient for us!

We received a call from a concerned resident about a small, fluffy bird on the ground; it had reportedly been there all day and was looking tired. We admitted him to our wildlife hospital and got to work assessing this young American Kestrel's condition. He was actually okay and healthy, but a little dehydrated from his ordeal. We were able to quickly correct that with a good meal, then once he had re-energized, his appropriately fierce spirit soon returned, just as we had hoped. We want to get raptors this young back to their parents ASAP; we do great work at the hospital but keeping wild families together is always our priority. This also allows our rehabilitation services to be reserved for those who are truly injured or orphaned. Keeping wild families together gives these birds the greatest chance of success in the wild, as they need to learn vital lessons and hunting skills alongside their parents.

While we love re-nesting, it is not without its challenges. It requires scouting the area to find the nest, then all the logistics of getting them back up where they belong. We sometimes rely on the experts at Skedaddle Humane Wildlife Control to assist with these situations, and we are grateful to them for their efforts. They went out to locate the nesting cavity this baby had fallen from and were initially stumped. While kestrels normally nest in trees, we know wild animals have adapted to urban environments in unique ways, so we also gave a keen eye to surrounding commercial buildings. It took some detective work and we all almost gave up, but we were overjoyed to find the nest location... in a vent! This bird's other siblings were still in there and they had clearly been thriving in the safety of their hidden oasis, so Skedaddle was able to put him right back in with his family where he belongs.


Reunions like this are only possible with the support of our community - together we are saving lives! Thank you!

Happy was found running loose with his signature smile on his face before being brought to our Racine Campus. During his intake exam, we discovered a concerning mass on his left thigh. Our veterinary team wasted no time removing it and sending it off for testing. We spent the next few weeks trying to distract him from those itchy stitches and convince him to keep wearing his post-surgery collar. We were thrilled to learn that the mass was benign, but not nearly as excited as Happy when his stitches finally came out. He was free from the cone, ready to find a family of his own, and it wasn't long before he did just that.

Happy has been living up to his name in his new life. He goes for a mile walk each morning and again in the evening, shows rope toys who is boss, and loves proving he can find the treat in any puzzle toy. At the end of the day, he's quick to cuddle up with dad on the recliner before bed. Congratulations on your fantastic family and all the smiles to come!



WHERE ARE THEY NOW? FORMER WILDLIFE REHABILITATION INTERN SALLY FAHR

This year has been exceptionally busy for our Wildlife Rehabilitation Center at the Wisconsin Humane Society, and while our team of licensed wildlife rehabilitators works incredibly hard, they also rely on a team of summer interns to assist with patient care during our busiest times. Most of these interns are college students interested in biology, animal welfare, or veterinary fields, and join our internship program to gain valuable experience and hands-on training with wildlife.

We love to keep in touch with these interns and see where their educational pursuits and careers lead. Working with wildlife is such a privilege and gives us great joy, but much like proud parents, we also get great joy out of seeing our past interns be successful. We have interns who have gone on to everything from getting PhDs studying Siberian Cranes in China, to becoming board-certified veterinarians, to running wildlife centers in and outside of Wisconsin!

It's a joy when interns stop by to visit or volunteer with us. One recent visitor was Sally Fahr! Sally was an intern with us for two summers, and we have seen her gain technical skills and confidence in her work. She is currently a third-year vet student at the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine, and when she's not studying wildlife diseases and treatments, she also enjoys working in the emergency department of the Wisconsin Veterinary Referral Center. We were grateful to Sally for recently catching us up on her internship experience with WHS.

Tell us about your internship with us and do you have any particularly memorable moments?

I spent two summers as an intern with the wildlife hospital during my undergraduate education. One of the most memorable things for me was working as a team and bonding with my co-interns. Some of the best (and funniest) moments happened as a result of conversations, inside jokes, and general silliness between the team. Spending quality time with the other interns during and outside of work made for a great experience.

What was the most fun part of the internship?

My favorite part of the internship was raising infant cottontail rabbits! I absolutely love bunnies, and it was wonderful to care for these babies and eventually release them back to the wild.

What skills or knowledge did you learn from your internship that you have found most useful?

During my internships, I learned so much about the handling, nutrition, disease control, and general husbandry of wild animals. This has been very helpful as I learn how to medically approach domestic and exotic species in school. I enjoy finding the similarities and differences in the treatment of wildlife compared to our common domestic animals.

Any words of advice for those who are perspective future interns?

Future interns: get ready to get your hands dirty! Animals are great, but they are messy and require a lot of physical husbandry. This is a great hands-on experience that requires hard workers who don't shy away from dirty work. If this sounds like you, please apply! :)
